# **GARDENING TIPS**, from Kate

This Spring, I would like to introduce you to a gift from the sun: **Soil Solarization**.

Sun Solarization is a soil management method that uses the sun to eliminate noxious elements from soil. It will destroy pest eggs, larva and adult bugs that have over wintered in the soil. And it destroys harmful bacteria, fungi and any viable weed plants and seeds that may be in the soil. It cleans soil for our home use and soil used in gifting plants to friends or to local plant sales.

It is a safe, effortless, chemical free method of sanitizing soil-borne pathogens from our gardens. Using the radiant energy from the sun, it raises the temperature of the soil, creating an environment that destroys many soil organisms and unwanted weed seeds and seedlings.

The process puts purchased bags (plastic sealed) of soil in an area of full sun, for 3 days. Turning the bags over after 2 days. Or bagging (plastic) soil from your garden that you intend to use for transplanting and processing it.

With this practice, you can have confidence that you are only gifting a plant. Happy Gardening!

## TIPS FOR SHOWING, from Gay MacQuarrie 🐝



Cutting Your Specimen – If the Show Schedule asks for three blooms, pick blooms that match in size and colour as much as possible (the Judge will take into consideration the growing season, etc., that may have affected plants). The cut stem length should be as it grows in the garden but, no longer than the Show Schedule stipulates or if there is a possibility that the specimen is unstable in the container. One exception to this rule of thumb is, when cutting **Asiatic Lilies** -- cut one 1/3 of the stem and leave 2/3 thirds behind to ensure the health of the flower's bulb for the next growing season.

Showing Your Specimen – Pick a stable, clear glass container. It can even be a pickle jar. Jars come in all shapes and sizes—using a narrow-mouthed jar helps your stem stand "proudly" to its best advantage and you are recycling!

Grooming Your Specimen - It's o.k. to remove yellow leaves from your specimen if it does not affect the overall display of the specimen(s) or, if a leaf has browned edges, trim the leaf with scissors maintaining the leaf's shape. Likely, the judge won't know you trimmed the leaf!

Judging - If the judge writes "N.A.S" on your entry tag, it means "Not According to Schedule". For example, you may not have shown the correct number of specimens specified in the Show Schedule. Play close attention to what is being asked for in the Schedule.
