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Dividing Perennials

Quick! It's getting late. Still time to divide perennials while the soil is unfrozen and now has finally received some rain.

October/November Activities:

- Transplant shrubs or young trees to new locations if desired. Divide perennials.
- Cut diseased areas out of perennials. Do not compost.
- Clean up garden debris. Remove vegetable plants and fallen fruit, and compost them.
- Leave perennial foliage and flowers with seeds for the birds.
- Bring in any exotic plants.
- Continue watering trees and shrubs until the ground freezes.
- Sharpen garden implements and pruners.
- Dig up tender bulbs such as dahlia, canna and gladiola. Wrap them in moist material and store in a cool, dark space.
- Current wisdom is to let our fallen leaves rest where they fall as they provide shelter for overwintering insects and pollinators.


